SITE VISIT REPORT 27 OCTOBER 2002



KEK LOK SI TEMPLE (Crag Mountain Supreme Paradise)

Promptly at 3.30pm. 7 I PHT members were led by Rev. Zheng Ming through small passageways \$ darkstaircases into a small room into which we all managed to squeeze. On a raised table, we were given therare privilege of viewing a collection of very life-like miniature statues of prominent early donors and previous chief monks of the temple. The 'who's who' of early Penang sat resplendent, all male except for one Honorable Madam Tan Say Siang, (co-incidentally, great-grand mother to Loh-Lim \$ member Lim Mee Linwho apparently played a critical philanthropic role of 'piped water supplier' to many early temples of Penang

We were then again honoured, this time with the rare privilege of viewing the very precious and historic collection of original sutras from China, ocated in another hall and locked behind grills. In the same hall, we were also shown a photo of the founder, Chief Abbot Beow Lean and a statue much larger than the others of Cheong Fatt Tze, befitting his status as major donor.

Together with Rev. Zheng, PHT member Goh Mai Loon bnefed us on the history of the temple which goes back to the time when Chief Abbot Beow Lean, of Kuan Yin Temple, the idea of having a centre for meditation and Buddhist teachings. With the help of 5 prominent leaders; Chang Yu Nan, Cheah Choon Seng, Cheong Fatt Tze, Chung Keng Kooi and Tye Kee Yoon, they bought 9 acres of land and construction began in 1886, with the first building completed in 1891. Co-incidentally, all 5 were Hakka, acted as vice-consuls for China in Penang and built their homes along Leith Street or Lean Hwa Ho'

In 1904, Chief Abbot Beow Lean came back with the imperial sanction from China, consisting of plaques with handwritings of Empress Dowager Tzu Hsi and Emperor Kuang Hsu, the credence for Buddha and Bodhisattva, initiatory copper bell and 70,000 volumes of sutras.

In the Great Hall or "Da Xiong Pao Dian", built in 1895 and the oldest part of the temple, chanting is carry out every morning and evening at 5.30am and 4.30pm. Statues of the 18 Lohans and 3 Buddhas are located here. Even with newer and bigger halls, this particular hall is still treated as the Great Hall, with the chanting instruments arranged in a specific format. The Heavenly Kings Hall or "Tian Wang Dian" was built in 1896. Here, one can see Maitreya Buddha also known as the laughing Buddha or the future Buddha for the next world. Flanking the corners are the 4 Heavenly Kings each with their own weapon, serpent, umbrella, guitar and sword. Behind laughing Buddha is Wei To Pu Sha, the guardian of the temple. The Hall of the Five Directions' Buddhas or "Wu Fang Fo Dan" was built in 1995 with materials from China. There are 5 main statues; Pi Lu Zhen Na Buddha (centre) with the other 4 Buddhas representing the 4 cardinal points. This hall combines a mixture of Beijing decorative ceiling works, Fukkien carved granite pillars, wall paintings and calligraphy by local artisans. The Pagoda of Ten Thousand Buddhas was built between 1915-1927, with donations from 3 major countries; China, Thailand and Burma. The 7 tiers pagoda combines 3 distinct styles of architecture; 1st to 3rd tier — Chinese, 4th to 5th — Thai and 6th to7th — Burmese. The Pagoda of Longevity or "Wu Liang Shou Ta" was built in 1974 with materials brought in from Taiwan. King Rama IX, Thailand donated a black statue of Buddha, located on the ground floor.

The Boddhisattvas' Hall or "Da Shi Dian" was rebuilt in 1992, on the site where the first building the temple was built (1891). There are 3 main statues; Pu Xian Pu Sha (left), Kuan Yin Pu Sha (middle) and Wen Shu Shi Li Pu Sha (right).

Although this site visit took slightly longer time, as a guide myself, I must say that we've all benefited from the tour. Thanks go to Rev. Zheng Ming for taking so much time with us, to the temple for their drinks and blessings, to Goh Mai Loon for giving such in depth information on the temple, to Mrs Chan Foek Seng for arranging such hospitality for us

from the monks and to Magdeline for purchasing the delicious curry puffs.

SITE VISIT REPORT 24 NOVEMBER 2002

THE PENANG WAR MUSEUM, BUKIT BATU MAUNG




Once again it was time for another PHT site visit and 52 members with kids in tow negotiated the path up to the Penang War Museum located at Batu Maung. The weather was pleasant, cool and breezy with a magnificent view of the bay and the marine repair centre, the site was well-shaded and most members were in shorts and sneakers and had some kind of torchlight in anticipation of the exploration of the reputed tunnels.

The members were broken up into two groups and were taken on a tour of the area by members of the Museum. The fort was surprisingly well maintained with its fortifications still intact. The reason was that the Japanese never actually bombed it. Built in the early 1930's with the use of Chinese labourers and completed in 1938, it was later called Bukit Punjab as the British brought Punjabi soldiers to man it. It could house 60 soldiers and troops from the nearby Minden Barracks came to train daily. As the gunnery was sea-ward facing and the Japanese came by land, no battle actually ever took place at the fort. The British abandoned it with the Japanese occupation and it was then used by the Japanese as an interrogation centre and to broadcast propaganda messages to taunt the British who had re-grouped in Singapore. An eerie sense of the past ferocity of interrogation methods and the inhumanity of man pervaded many of the rooms which had evidence of bullet holes on walls.

The underground bunkers and tunnels are intact. The bunkers are being used as exhibition halls with relics from the war, blown-up photographs of torture methods, war trials, George Town under attack and collections of battle paraphernalia. The air in the bunkers and tunnels was surprising not stuffy, a testament to the ingenuity of the 70 year old ventilation systems. The exploration of the pitch-black tunnels by the adventurous few revealed some local residents such as bats, frogs and the ever-resilient cockroach.

Those with imaginative minds could, with ease, visualize the soldiers manning the fort during the war days, soldiers at the lookout points, the sound of heavy boots in the bunkers and tunnels. An interesting comment on the social structure of the day could be found in the division of quarters, the British, the Indians and the Malays, each with their own kitchens for differing food preparations.

The rain held off till the end of the tour. Those who stayed behind a little longer were rewarded by delicious Mee Udang prepared by the chefs at the cafeteria, all washed down with fresh Umra juice.

This was one of the resolu-This was one of the resolu-tions presented to the state government during the Penang Tourism Forum 2002, by state Forestry Department director Dr Mohd Yunus Zakaria who chaired a panel on tourism products. Dr Mohd Yunus went on to

say that George Town's com-munity population had to be maintained to conserve its

maintained to conserve its cultural heritage.

"The revised rental rates are too high. That results in the community moving out of the city. When they move out,

are too high. That results in the community moving out of the city. When they move out, their culture goes with them," he said, adding that the government had to revise the rental rates to prevent the depletion of the population.

Dr Mohd Yunus said all tourism products had to be well managed and presented, adding that tourism product promotion and infrastructure facilities in Seberang Prais were far behind compared to those on the island.

He called for more support from the government and tour operators to promote and market Seberang Prai's tourism products. "Market Penang as a whole, not the island alone," he said.

Penang Tourist Centre (PTC) director Lawrence Koay, who chaired a panel on tourism services, spoke of the importance of information technology (IT) and the need to be more IT-savvy in businesses.

Koay said that although

Koay said that although Penang food was tasty, there was a problem with hygiene.



He said the Penang Hawkers Association pledged to co-operate in promoting good hygiene, but he felt that there was lack of enforcement against untrained or unli-

against untrained or unli-censed hawkers in Penang On transportation, he said the trishaw riders in Penang required the state's help to maintain their unique service by providing them with pro-motional items and training on tourism products. He also said the time had come for the tourism sector in Penang to be more dis-abled-friendly. Cititel Penang chief operat-

Cititel Penang chief operat-ing officer Eric Lim, who chaired a panel on marketing and promotions, said there was a need for Penang to focus on the domestic tourism

focus on the domestic tourism front.

He said the general consensus was that culture and heritage was one of the key elements to promote in Penson.

He said there was a need for the state to be more actively engaged in promoting tourism, and there was

The UNESCO ASIA-PACIFIC HERITAGE AWARDS for Culture Heritage Conservation AWARDS

UNESCO's Asia-Pacific Heritage Awards for Culture Heritage Conservation recognize the efforts and contributions of individuals and organizations within the private sector, including private-public partnerships, who have successfully restored and conserved structures and buildings of heritage value in the Asia-Pacific region.

The annual Heritage Awards programme is one strategy the Office of the UNESCO Regional Advisor for Culture in Asia and the Pacific is using to promote conservation of the region's built heritage, which is often threatened by unchecked development, neglect, or inappropriate reuse.

UNESCO believes that recognising successful preservation efforts helps spur additional projects within the same community advocating the culture of preservation and conservation through the use of appropriate conservation techniques and approaches.

CHENG HOON TENG TEMPLE, MELAKA, MALAYSIA

The restoration of the 17th-century temple, the oldest edifice of formal worship for the Chinese immigrant community of Malay peninsula, demonstrates high standards of technical execution and sets a worthy precedent for other conservation work in Malaysia and the region. The detailed documentation of the historic building and the restoration process is commendable, resulting in a clear understanding of the project's sound methodology and best conservation practices. The project successfully illustrates faithful use of original materials and integrity of artisan techniques, and has revived the historic building for the community as a centre of worship.

2003 UNESCO Heritage Conservation Award Announced

Bangkok, 13 November 2002 – Entries are now being accepted for the UNESCO Asia-Pacific Heritage 2003 Awards for Cultural Heritage Conservation. The awards programme, in its fourth year, recognizes the achievement of individuals and organizations within the private sector, and public-private initiatives, in successfully restoring structures of heritage value in the Asia-Pacific region.

Projects involving buildings more than fifty years old and which were completed within the last ten years are eligible for consideration. Houses, commercial, cultural, religious, industrial or institutional buildings, gardens and bridges, for example, are all eligible for consideration. Public-private partnership projects such as historic towns, urban quarter and rural settlements where the essential elements are more than 50 years old are all eligible.

Entries for the Heritage 2002 Awards drew 46 projects from 15 countries and administrative areas in the Asia-Pacific Region. The selection process was conducted by a panel of international conservation experts in architecture, urban planning, landscape design and heritage conservation. The top winner of the year 2002 was Ahhichatragarh Fort, Nagaur, Rajasthan in India. All winning entries demonstrated excellence in their understanding of the issues of conservation in relation to the cultural, social, historical and architectural significance of the building, employment of appropriate building and artisan techniques as well as use of appropriate materials. All winning entries made a significant impact in the surrounding environment contributing to the cultural and historical continuum of the community.

Entries for the year 2003 awards programme must be submitted with an official entry form, drawings, photographs and project description to the UNESCO Office of the Regional Advisor for Culture in Asia and the Pacific in Bangkok by 31 March 2003. Complete programme information, including an entry form, is available on the web at http://www.unescobkk.org/culture/heritageawards.

Winners will be announced in September 2003. One entry will receive the "Award of Excellence", two selected entries will receive an "Award of Distinction", five selected entries will receive an "Award of Merit" and a number of

entries will receive an "Honourable Mention".



Urban Blight - An Update by Ahmad Chik / Loh-Lim

"How often have you stumbled over a broken pavement, and silently cursed the local authority, or with averted eyes and bated breathe hastened past a pile of uncollected rubbish? Welcome to our Urban Blight programme."

On October 12th a Beach Street Ideas Competition was launched. The closing date is 11th January 2003. It is an attempt to solicit ideas from the public with regards to the revitalisation of Beach Street

In November a meeting was called to check on whether identified problems on Beach Street (the sample street chosen) - cracked pavements, broken drains, inaccessible sidewalks, dangerous or unsightly signage, blocked pavements, un-coordinated installation of amenities and services etc - had been rectified.

Some improvements had been recorded while much remained to be carried out.

In December, Chairman of the Beach Street Committee, Councillor Mark Ooi called another meeting, this time with representatives from TNB, Postals and Talikoms in order to work through the problems of co-ordination, designs, installation locations etc. The Committee was also informed that RM\$2 million had been allocated from the Federal Government for the upgrading of Beach Street along historic guidelines and with a view to impelmenting disabled access and pedestrian friendly walkways.


The 4 Lijiang Models for Co-operation among stakeholders

A closed-door workshop is being held in Penang as evaluation and mainstreaming of a recently completed 4-year project backed by the Norwegian Government and sponsored by the World Heritage Committee. The objectives involve the modeling of new ways of mutually beneficial co-operation between the tourism and heritage sectors, particularly at the local community level, in historic towns across the region.

Representatives of 8 pilot sites as well as international experts are involved. The workshop is also being viewed as an opportunity to expose local policy makers and strategists to policies, problems and management strategies for culture heritage management and tourism of other

historic towns.

The 8 pilot sites are namely: Lijiang, China Hoi An, Vietnam Bhaktapur, Nepal Vigan, Philippines Kandy, Sri Lanka Levuka, Fiji Luang Prabang, Lao PDR Melaka, Malaysia



Although not one of the original 8 site, Penang has been chosen as the venue for the current workshop as it is felt that Penang has taken on board many aspects of the Lijiang models. The stature of Penang will hopefully also be enhanced as a prospective World Heritage Site. And on the 30th October 2002, the PHT had a very distinguished visitor - the well-known multi-award winning author, PETER CLEARY.

An Australian by birth, Peter now resides in New York. He was in Penang to gather material and to check on settings for part of his new novel which is partially based on the Japanese Occupation in Penang. He sought assistance from the Penang Heritage Trust and conducted interviews with Salma, Laurence, Loh-Lim among others. He was also introduced to several 'old timers' who could recall Japanese Occupation times.

For those of you unfamiliar with Peter Cleary, a little blurb..... among the books he wrote, 'Illywhacker' was shortlisted for the The Booker Prize in 1985.

'Oscar and Lucinda' won the award in 1988.

'Bliss', 'Oscar and Lucinda' and 'Jack Maggs' won the Miles Franklin Award while his novel 'True History of the Kelly Gang' was shortlisted for the same award in 2001.

"Illywhacker", "The Unusual Life of Tristan Smith" and "Jack Maggs" all won The Age Book of the Year Award. "Illywhacker" won the Ditmar Award for Best Australian Science Fiction Novel in 1986 and was nominated for the World Fantasy Award for Best Novel in the same year.


In May 1998, it was announced that 'Jack Maggs' had won the 1998 Commonwealth Writers Prize. 'True History of the Kelly Gang' won the 2001 Commonwealth Writers Prize, and the 2001 Booker Prize.

SRI MUTIARA, THE RESIDENCY 1890



Seri Mutiara stands as an icon landmark in the architectural landscape of Penang. First commissioned in 1888 as the 'seat of the Resident Councillor, it is located on 12 hectares of sprawling and delightful parkland, complete with streams, bridges and matured trees.

Both the architect, Major Sir Maurice Alexander Cameron R.E. Kama and the engineer, Major H.E. McCallum, came from a military tradition in India. Thus while the Residency is built in the style of a stately English manor, it is distinct in its form as reminiscent of Anglo-Indian architecture, found in the Straits Settlements at the time. Originally budgeted at \$48,000 Straits dollars, it eventually cost a princely sum of \$81,173 upon completion.

Seri Mutiara has had the honour of housing every Penang Head of State for the past 110 years. Each British Resident and subsequently after independence in 1957, each Governor, instituted various alterations, additions and removals that have changed the original house form as well as the surrounding grounds. With George Town on UNESCOs Tentative List as a World Heritage site, the Governors Residence is viewed as an integral part of the city's remarkably rich and diverse heritage. The State Government has therefore seen it fit to restore its original authenticity while upgrading the premises, a move which dovetails with the State's vision and plans of heritage development on an international arena.

The current restoration works in progress are being conducted on an inter national 'best practice basis. Seri Mutiara stands as one of the most important buildings in Penang and this meticulous restoration signifies commitment to the city and its history and is a landmark project not just for the Government but for all Penangites.

BEL RETIRO - THE RESIDENCY ON THE HILL

23 RD FEBRUARY SITE VISIT- [TO BE CONFIRMED BY E-MAIL OR CALL THE OFFICE]

Immortalized in all the great paintings of Penang in the 19th Century, Bel Retiro is certainly Penang Hill's most impressive building. Built at 2,541 feet above sea level, it provided much needed relief from the heat of the lowlands and was the favourite resort of high government officials and visiting dignitaries. It is said that the Colonial Governor would live up in the cool of the hills in Bel Retiro and only descend once a month to the lowlands when the mail boat arrived. Commanding a magnificent view of the port, ships could be seen arriving and the lighthouse at Fort Cornwallis was used as a signal point with returning signals from the hill top. In fact, Bel Retiro was often referred to as Flagstaff Hill.

Back by popular request - Penang Hill re-visited - for those of you who were not with us in year 2000 - the first Penang Hill site visit although dampened by continuous rain, turned out to be one of the most enthusiastic and certainly one of the most physically challenging trips we've made.

We're going to try again so please arrange to <u>be at the gate house entrance to Bel Retiro at 3 p.m.</u> whether you hike or drive or take the train. Be warned, the train is very crowded on Sundays.

Again, our Vice-President Ahmad Chik (non-official mayor of Penang Hill)has kindly consented to be our host. If members wish we may visit Crag Hotel aka Uplands School aka Catherine Deneuve's home in 'IndoChine'.

MASJID MELAYU, LEBUH ACHEH

Many PHT members have been enquiring about the current situation with the proposed development plans for the mosque and area, which is one of the few in Penang actually gazetted by the Federal Government under the Museum and Antiquities Act of 1976.

Local descendant Zakaria Basheer reports that the fate of the area and mosque houses now hinges on whether the area is degazetted or the boundaries modified.

On 15th November 2002, 15 delegates from the community presented a memorandum to the Chief Minister during the sitting of the State Assembly. Many reports have appeared in the press, many voices, from university academics to local community groups, descendants and family to conservation ngo's, are involved in the efforts to preserve both the area and the community. There is little concrete to report. Negotiations are on-going, efforts continue.

Don: Project will destroy links to the past

PENANG: The proposed redevelopment of Kampung Masjid Melayu in Lebuh Acheh would wipe out the only remaining evidence of early urban Malay settlement in the century.

Universiti Sains Malaysia Universiti Sains Malaysia (USM) conservation expert Associate Prof Dr A. Ghafar Ahmad said the houses surrounding the 200-year-old Masjid Melayu were the oldest urban Malay settlement in Penang and their architecture was unique in the world. "To destroy these houses is to destroy any historical evidence linking the present urban Muslims in Penang to their past," he told a press conference at Lebuh Acheh yesterday.

yesterday.

He said the architecture of the houses in Lebuh Acheh was different from kampung houses, which was synony-mous with the Malay identity and hence, they were unique even within the context of

Malay architecture.
"This area has been designated as a heritage enclave in the Penang's nomination for the Unesco World Heritage Site. To bulldoze the houses here for later each housing. here for low-cost housing redevelopment would defi-nitely detract from the effort," he said.

effort," he said.

Dr Ghafar, whose restoration of the Masjid Melayu won the Historic Mosque Preservation Award from Saudi Arabia, said the site was an early Islamic printing and publishing centre, and was also once known as the "second Jeddah" as it was a centre for haj pilgrims going to Mecca.

USM literature professor Dr Mohd Haji Salleh said the contribution of urban Malays to the development of George Town would be forever lost if

Town would be forever lost if the redevelopment plans were to go ahead.

"Our children and visitors from all over the world would wonder where the evidence of Malay contribution is, when




